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## Tell a Story Through Cartooning

Billy Ireland was born in Chillicothe in 1880. He began working as a cartoonist for the *Columbus Dispatch* shortly after graduating from high school. While there, he nurtured the talents of other Ohio cartoonists such as Milton Caniff, Dudley Fisher and Ray Evans. All three went on to create widely-circulated and well-known cartoon series.



He was a tireless supporter of community improvements, an avid outdoorsman, a perceptive critic of political events, and a generous mentor."

- What if you learned something from a site on the Ohio Creativity Trail and became inspired to try something new? What if something unexpected happened when you did?












## **Create Your Own Carousel Design**

Have you noticed that one side of a carousel figure tends to be more elaborately decorated than the other? Or that the figures on the outer ring are often the most ornate and typically larger than those in the inner rings?

In the early days of carousels, ride operators were paid per ride. That meant they had to find a way to attract customers. One way was to put their most vibrant and captivating figures facing outward to draw attention. However, the intricate carving and painting required was costly, so they focused their time and resources on enhancing the side of the figure that faced the guests. This is referred to as the "romance" side of a carousel figure.

Using the carousel horse drawing on the next page, create your own carousel design! You may choose a theme (such as a patriotic America 250-Ohio) or just let your imagination gallop wild and free.










#### **Sketch Your World**

One of America's most respected painters, Ohio-born Charles
Burchfield captured the romance of everyday life, particularly nature. He studied at the Cleveland School of Art (now the Cleveland Institute of Art). His work was influenced by the school's watercolor painting tradition and the artist Henry Keller, who helped establish Cleveland as an important place for watercolorists.


Using a black marker, start sketching. The goal isn't to make it entirely realistic, and don't forget that you can exaggerate perspectives just like Lichtenstein often did.
