








Ohio is a destination for art lovers. World-class museums and vibrant art scenes are found throughout the state. Early industrialists, like John D. Rockefeller and Edward Drummond Libbey, established museums through financial gifts or by donating their personal art collections. A new approach to philanthropic funding emerged in Ohio, with The Cleveland Foundation—recognized as the world's first nonprofit foundation—leading the way for future contributions to support the arts and local communities.

Notable artists with ties to Ohio made their marks on various movements, including George Bellows and John Sloan in the Ashcan School, and Roy Lichtenstein in Pop Art. The Cleveland School, a network of artists founded in 1910, was influenced by the Arts and Crafts movement. Moses Jacob Ezekiel, the first Jewish-American sculptor recognized internationally, studied at the Cincinnati Art School. Cleveland artist Julian Stanczak pioneered the Op Art movement.

1 Akron Art Museum

Showcasing regional, national and international works since the 1850s, this museum is particularly strong in contemporary painting and sculpture and 20th century photography, including the works by Ohio State University grad Joan Liftin. This celebrated photographer aimed to "live life authentically, and to be ruthless in documenting that life," wrote an art colleague. Liftin's photographs capture authenticity with a style that evokes a range of emotions.

2 Allen Memorial Art Museum

The Allen Memorial Art Museum is recognized as one of the nation's top academic art museums. Visitors to this intimate museum are greeted with the museum's motto carved above the arched entryway - "The Cause of Art is the Cause of the People" by William Morris. 3 Burchfield Homestead Museum

Called "the most important house in American art history," the Burchfield Homestead was where the visionary artist spent time "gathering the materials for a lifetime." Charles Burchfield lived and painted in this Salem house from the age of five to 28. He was part of The Cleveland School, an impressive group of watercolorists and other artists that flourished in northeast Ohio between 1910 and 1960.

The Butler Institute of American Art is one of the earliest museums dedicated exclusively to collecting, exhibiting, and preserving the art of America's past, present, and future. 13 Columbus Museum of Art

This museum inspires creativity through its late nineteenth and early twentieth-century American and European modern works of art, including Ohio artists such as Aminah Brenda Lee Robinson, Elijah Pierce, and George Bellows. Columbus-born Bellows was one of the most influential artists of his generation for his gritty portrayals of urban life.

14 Ohio Statehouse

This Greek Revival building houses working government chambers and offices side-by-side public monuments, portraits, sculptures and paintings of important moments in the state's history. Its public art collection and architectural details are highlighted during self-guided, cell phone and guided tours. "Ohioans in Space," the work of Perrysburg artist Bill Hinsch, was unveiled in 2024 and highlights Ohioans who have broken barriers in space exploration.

The museum's most significant collections are in printmaking and photography, but the museum also prides itself on collecting work by Ohio artists. Among the many Ohio artists exhibited are Sallie Humphreys, Sidney Chafetz and Robert Henri, a leading figure of the Ashcan School of American realism and organizer of a group known as "The Eight," artists who protested the restrictive exhibition practices of the National Academy of Design.

Founded in 1919, the museum's collection spans 5,000 years of art history, including important American, Ancient American, Asian and European fine and decorative art collections, and numbers more than 27,000 objects. Situated on three acres of scenic sculpture park grounds, the museum features five galleries of changing exhibitions and a growing permanent collection of more than 17,500 artworks. Among its Ohio artists featured is Cincinnati's Elizabeth Nourse, the first American woman to be voted into the Société Nationale des Beaux-Arts.

22 Cincinnati Art Museum

Cincinnati has been an important center of art and design in the Midwest since the late 1800s. The museum opened in 1886 as the first art museum built specifically for that purpose west of the Allegheny Mountains. In 2003, the museum became the first in the nation to dedicate a wing to its hometown art history. Today, the museum is top-ranked for its collection of more than 67,000 objects, spanning 6,000 years of art.



Ohio is the "original" place to many celebrated storytellers, including Toni Morrison (Lorain), Sherwood Anderson (Clyde), James Thurber (Columbus), Harriet Beecher Stowe (Cincinnati), and Superman creators Jerry Siegel and Joe Shuster (Cleveland). Through their words and illustrations, Ohioans create new worlds, inspire change and foster community healing.

1 Karamu House

Karamu House, a "place of joyful gathering," has served as a cultural home for Black artists since its founding in 1915, initially drawing neighborhood residents into the settlement house through theatre. It has launched high-level careers and influenced artistic trends in visual arts, dance, and theatre, and produced the works of a host of Black playwrights, most notably Langston Hughes. Exhibits tell these stories and are accessible during operating hours.








Ohio has long been at the center of music movements, with Cleveland being known as the birthplace of the term "rock and roll." Dayton, Columbus, Toledo, Akron and others fostered local musicians and helped bands rise in popularity. Ohio's contribution to music extends across the boundaries of genres and even created new ones. Ohio musicians blended blues, jazz, and country into new forms such as funk and hip-hop. The state's central location between other music hubs exposed artists to different styles and helped spread their new sounds to Nashville, New York and Chicago. Musical opportunities still abound throughout the state of Ohio.






Glass & Pottery artisans, glass blowers, ceramics artisans



Ohio's rich deposits of sand, clay, and limestone provided the raw materials for Indigenous peoples to craft practical and ceremonial items. Later, this abundance of materials, along with shipping and rail access, led to a thriving pottery industry in cities like East Liverpool and Zanesville. Ohioans played key roles in the Studio Glass Movement and the American Art Pottery Movement. Cincinnati became a center for decorative arts with the Rookwood Pottery Company, known for its innovative blend of American and Japanese aesthetics. Known as the "Glass City," Toledo inspires artists to push creative boundaries. Across Ohio, countless opportunities await to discover unique artistic and functional pieces, learn from skilled experts, and experience the stories that breathe life into these astonishing designs.



Carousels evoke nostalgia, especially in Ohio, home to one of the largest collections in the United States. Introduced by German immigrants, carousels and carousel carving quickly took hold in the nation. The first carousel to operate in the United States is said to have occurred in Hessville, Ohio, in the 1840s. Cincinnati soon became home to two carousel manufacturers during the art form's heyday. In 1986, Carousel Works out of Mansfield revitalized the tradition after decades of dormancy. When the company closed following the pandemic, several of these artisans set up shop in Ohio to continue the legacy. Ohio also influenced carousel music, with two band organ companies - Wurlitzer Company (founded in Cincinnati) and the Stinson Band Organ Company (Bellefontaine).



Likewise, Ohio's legacy in advertising is prominent, exemplified by the iconic Mail Pouch Tobacco barn ads and the Goodyear Blimp, which demonstrate the state's pioneering spirit in visual communication and marketing.

Ohio's vibrant folk-art traditions, influenced by its diverse immigrant, regional culture and religious communities, showcase the state's commitment to preserving heritage through quilting, woodworking, and storytelling. From the minimalist yet elegant designs of Shaker artisans to the intricate carvings displayed at the Warther Museum, the question of whether function or beauty holds greater importance need not have an answer. Ohioans value their heritage, which is reflected not only in building preservation but also in the ways traditional folk art practices are preserved, taught, and celebrated.
